

AND IN THE MATTER OF THE DESIGNATION OF THE PROPERTY KNOWN MUNICIPALLY AS 9 CHURCH STREET, IN THE CITY OF TORONTO, IN THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 30th day of April, 1984 decided to designate the lands and buildings known municipally as 9 Church Street (Commercial Building) as a property of architectural value or interest, under the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980 Chapter 337.

Short Statement of Reasons for the Proposed Designation

The property at 9 Church Street, which includes the convenience numbers, 7, 11 and 13 Church Street, is recommended for designation for architectural reasons. It was built in 1877-78 for owner, Mary Strange, as a row of three commercial units with matching facades. Faced in buff brick, the facades are divided by shallow pilasters with original fenestration that has segmental arches and continuous undulating header bandcourses existing on the upper floors. The lower floors of 13 Church Street were altered for a wool merchant to incorporate stone lintels and decorative spandrel panels with sculptural rams' heads motifs. This row reinforces the distinctive commercial character of the historic St. Lawrence Market district.

Notice of the Objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of the 15th day of May, 1984.
