Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 1st day of October, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 55-67 College Street, as a property of architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.


Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Victoria Hospital for Sick Children (later Ontario Government Offices), Nos. 55-67 College Street at 100 Laplante Avenue, through Elizabeth Street, 1892 by Darling and Pearson.

The Victoria Hospital for Sick Children is recommended for designation as the early work of an architectural firm of the first importance and as an early example of the use of the high-roofed, picturesque 'Chateau Style' that in the twentieth century became very popular in Canadian architecture. The building is also important in contextual terms because it occupies a full block's frontage on College Street.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of October 10th, 1975.
