Take Notice that the Council of the Corporation of the Borough of East York, at its meeting held on September 2, 1986, passed By-law No. 87-86 to designate the property municipally known as 67-93 Douglas Crescent, in accordance with the provisions of the Ontario Heritage Act.

Short Statement of Reasons for the Proposed Designation.

The property at 67-93 Douglas Crescent, known as Governor's Manor, was designed by Eustace G. Bird and is recommended for designation for architectural reasons. The two storey main and flanking wings were built in 1928 in the sixteenth century Tudor style to surround a spacious courtyard. The courtyard and distinctive brick and half-timbered facades facing the courtyard comprise a unique example of a Tudor form of architecture in the area.

To designate the Property at No. 67-93 Douglas Crescent of architectural value.

- 3. The Borough Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Borough of East York.
