NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 1st day of October, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 75 Front Street West, as a property of historical and architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

Union Station, (75) Front Street West between Bay Street and York Street; 1913-20 by Ross & Macdonald; Hugh G. Jones, and John M. Lyle.

Union Station is listed for architectural reasons as perhaps the finest railway station surviving in Canada and one of the finest in North America. The building is also significant as the work of a group of Canadian architects of the first importance and for its historical association with transportation in Canada and with the continuing life of the City of Toronto. In addition, its relation to the streetscape, creating with the Dominion Public Building to the east, a monumental processional way, is of great importance to the architectural character of the downtown core.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of October 10th, 1975.
