

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 17th and 19th days of September, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 48 Lakeshore Boulevard West, as a property of architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122. The reason for the proposed designation is that the property is a notable example of the work of an interesting Toronto architect, incorporating much high quality decorative work by Canadian artists. As such it is demonstrative of the federal government's role as a patron of the arts.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of September 26th 1975.
