
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 15th day of October, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 170-174 College Street, as a property of architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation.

The Mining Building, University of Toronto, 170-174 College Street, at Kings College Road (NE) probably c.1905 by Darling & Pearson, The Mining Building of the University of Toronto is recommended for designation for its importance as a major work of Edwardian Classicism by one of the most important firms of Canadian architects. It is, however, also significant in terms of streetscape for the way in which its extended mass defines the line of College Street, without bearing down on it oppressively.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of January 16th, 1976. (Reference File 0815).
