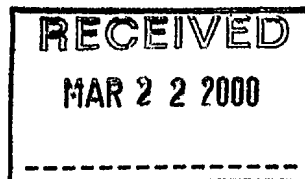

Dear Sir/Madam:

Take notice the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Centre Wellington intends to designate the properties, including lands and buildings, at the following municipal addresses as property of architectural and/or historical value or interest under Part IV of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990.

235 St. David Street South, Fergus

A large two-storey residence built in 1912 by W. G Beatty, using oversize red brick possibly recovered from shipping ballast. A 1929 extension uses the same brick. The general style is "Arts and Crafts" with an eyebrow window, large second floor roof dormers with stucco finish, and a sweeping curved roofline to the significant front porch.

17 Henderson Street, Elora

An Ontario vernacular style house built in 1858 for Rev. John MacGregor, Headmaster of Elora Grammar School. The material is random stone with roughly squared quoins, opening corners and lintel voussoirs. The gable window is an arched form. The windows are the original wood double hung sash with storm windows.

7224 Sideroad 10, Pilkington

A redbrick schoolhouse from 1902. The exterior is unchanged except for a dormer and roof balcony added in the 1970's. The interior has been modified for residential use. The tall classroom windows and entrances remain, and there is full stone basement extending to well above grade.

7620 Sideroad 10, Nichol

A one and a half storey random coursed stone farmhouse dating from the 1860's. The windows and entrances have the original wood frames with curved stone voussoir lintels and a semi-circular arch to the attic floor. The roof has fretwork gables.

4 Sophia Street, Salem

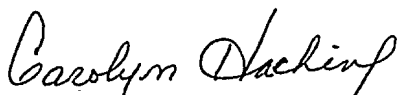
A one and a half storey red brick residence built in the 1870's probably for Isaac Modeland. There are yellow brick quoins and door surrounds. Additions to the northwest and southwest have continued the use of red brick with yellow brick emphases. A simple porch and fret worked gable complete the main façade.

132 St. Andrew Street West, Fergus

A three storey stone business building dating from 1870. The stone is cut, tooled, and cursed with band coursing at the third floor. Stone pediments in the windows are curved at the second floor level, and triangular at the third floor level. The wood store front and cornice are of a later date but are compatible with the original building.

Notice of objection to the proposed designations, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the Township of Centre Wellington before the 14th day of April, 2000.
