

"The Garrow House", built around 1850, has been recommended
for designation for architectural reasons. This large home
is a Georgian style residence proportioned by large front
windows and two end chimneys. Other details on the house
are impressive including the Palladian window, the decorative
brackets and stone lintels and keystones. The first and
second storey verandahs surround the house and wind past the
side to the garage. The house was once the home of James T.
Garrow until he became a Supreme Court Judge and later a
Local Judge of the Canadian Exchequer Court.
