Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of North York on the 20th day of September, 1982, decided to designate the lands and building known municipally as 3100 Keele Street as a property of architectural and historic interest or significance under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Charlton-Bull House, 3100 Keele Street is recommended for designation for architectural and historic reasons as an important Classic Revival residence at the centre of an institutional complex. Of special interest are: the wide central gable on the two-storey, five-bay facade of the original house; the fine proportions of the six-over-six fenestration; the cornice returns at gable ends and on the centre gable, and interior trim of very high quality. It is believed to have been built about 1854 by John Charlton and was also home to Bartholomew Hill Bull.

It has always been important in the religious life of the community at large, first serving local Methodists. In recent times it was a synagogue, a Christian church, and currently functions as a shrine temple.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the City Clerk within thirty days of October 15, 1982.
