Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 4th day of February, 1976, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 289 Sumach Street, as a property of architectural and historical value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, 1974 S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The former Ontario Women's Medical College (now APEC Packaging Co.), 289 Sumach Street. The former Women's Medical College, built c.1883 by Smith & Gemmell, is recommended for designation for its historical association with medical education in the Province of Ontario. It is also recommended for architectural reasons as the work of an important firm of Toronto architects.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of the 13th day of February, 1976. (Reference File 1106).
