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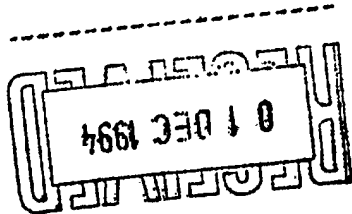


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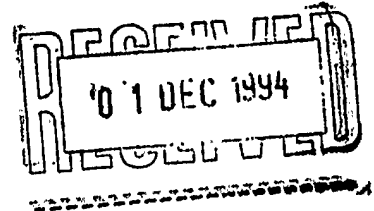

IN THE MATTER OF THE ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT, R.S.O. 1990 CHAPTER O.18 AND IN THE MATTER OF THE LANDS AND PREMISES KNOWN MUNICIPALLY AS THE GEORGE S. HENRY HOUSE, 17 MANORPARK COURT IN THE CITY OF NORTH YORK, IN THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of North York on the July 14, 1993, decided to designate the lands and building known municipally as The George S. Henry House, 17 Manorpark Court as a property of architectural and historical interest or significance under *The Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O 1990 Chapter O.18.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The core of the house was built circa 1840 by sawmill owner Stillwell Willson. The property was purchased by George S. Henry in 1898, who enlarged and renovated the house in circa 1900 and 1912. Henry was Ontario's tenth premier, and is best remembered for his initiatives to improve the province's road network. The community of Oriole takes its name from Oriole Lodge Farm.

Architecturally, the house is eclectic in composition. The earliest portion is of plank-on-plank construction, while the remainder is balloon frame. The whole is clad in variegated yellow brick with decorative clinker brick accents, dressed limestone lintels and lugsills, and date stones. Other significant features include the front verandah, polygonal tower, double hung windows, front doorcase, and gable roof with wall dormers and single stack chimneys.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the City Clerk within thirty days of December 1, 1994.
