





BY-LAW NO. 82-48

Being a By-Law to designate the Severn River Inn under the Ontario Heritage Act.

Pursuant to the Ontario Heritage Act, Chapter 337 R.S.O., Council may designate buildings of Architectural and Historical importance.

WHEREAS the Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee has recommended to Council the designation of the Severn River Inn on Lot 1 E.M.R. and was accepted the 22nd day of February, 1982.

AND WHEREAS the intention to designation was advertised commencing on the 3rd day of March, 1982 in accordance with the Ontario Heritage Act for three successive weeks,

AND WHEREAS the present owners is desirous of; and agree to; the designation of their property.

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection was servied on the Clerk of the Municipality,

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF GRAVENHURST HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- (1) That the Severn River Inn on Lot 1 E.M.R. Township of Morrison now in the Town of Gravenhurst is hereby designated of Architectural and historical importance for the reasons attached hereto in Schedule "A".
- (2) The Municipal Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule A hereto in the property land registry office.
- (3) The Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served on the owner of the aforesaid property and on the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of the passing of this by-law to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks.

READ A FIRST, SECOND AND THIRD time and finally passed this 10th day of May, 1982.

River Inn Severn

Reasons to be Registered together with Designating By-Law

- James H.Jackson, an English settler, pionecred at the site of the Inn and built a log cabin close to it, beside the riverlog cabin apparently evolved into a small general store for settlers
- Store became Muskoka's first post office as of Jan. 1st, with 1861: J.H. Jackson acting as postmaster
- James H. Jackson died, son James H. Jackson 11 continued with 1894: store (now a white frame boilding on the site of the present Severn River Inn, containing the post office and telephone exchange) James H. Jackson 11 seems to have entered the hostelry business,
 - by erecting a white frame tourist house behind the store near the river
- Fire destroyed much of north Severn Bridge, including both of .1906: Jackson"s buildings
- Present brick building erected on site of old store by Joseph 1907: W. Jackson, brother of J.H. Jackson 11, was used as store, post office, telephone exchange, and boarding house for tourists and others
- Hotel sold to Arthur Fawcett, who continued to run a store, hotel, 1943: and telephone exchange, - was also postmaster
- Hotel sold to Jan F. Kreutzer of Gravenhurst 1972:
- Hotel sold to Jim Russell of Gravenhurst, who turned it into a pub 1974: (store closed earlier by Art Fawcett)
- Hotel sold to J. Ross Raymond 1981:

Architecturally, the Inn is a significant example of the early Muskoka store and Inn construction. I · exterior features a store front facade of two six-paned windows, with round arched wooden windows throughout the building. A number of these windows still retain a special etched glass in the upper portion of the pane. Originally, a pillared verandah existed on six sides of the T-shaped building, with a small railed private balcony over the verandah. In the interior, the original vertical four inch tongue and grove V-joint wall panelling still exists, along with the sculptured six inch pine trim. The parlour is distinguished by a sculptured pine archwaynand pillars.
