BY-LAW 872-90

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A By-law to designate a certain building to be of Historical significance


WHEREAS it is deemed desirable by the Council of the Town of Napanee that a certain building within the Town be designated as a building of historical significance

NOW THEREFORE be it enacted as a by-law of the Corporation of the Town of Napanee by the Council thereof as follows:

- (1) That the following building in the Town of Napanee be designated as a building of historical significance
- (2) 220 Dundas Street West  
Willed to the Allan Macpherson family as part of a 200 acre parcel by an employee Frederick Hessford, this building was once owned by Thomas Casey, proprietor of the Post Express, and also the home of W.S. Herrington, Lawyer, and author of the History of Lennox and Addington County. The red brick Italianate villa style has a two storey square tower favoured in the Italianate vogue. A two and a half storey rectangular section extends to the west. Arched windows are ornamented by brick voussoirs. Generous verandahs and a closed-in porch at the main entrance suggest a late Victorian date. The present owners are [REDACTED].

This By-law will become effective on the date of its passing.

This By-law read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 19th day of March, 1990.
