BY-LAW 873-90

A By-law to designate a certain building to be of Historical significance


WHEREAS it is deemed desirable by the Council of the Town of Napanee that a certain building within the Town be designated as a building of historical significance

NOW THEREFORE be it enacted as a by-law of the Corporation of the Town of Napanee by the Council thereof as follows:

- (1) That the following building in the Town of Napanee be designated as a building of historical significance
- (2) 232 Dundas Street West
Willed to the Allan Macpherson family as part of a 200 acre parcel by an employee Frederick Hessford, this building is a large red brick house with several wings and is situated on one of the few remaining large lots in Napanee. Augustus Hooper, a mill owner at Camden East and a Member of Parliament, bought the house for his son Edmund Hooper, first representative of Addington in the Ontario Legislative Assembly. Built in Gothic Revival style, the high arched windows, reminiscent of Gothic cathedral windows, are distinguished by segmental brick voussoirs and stone sills. Fretwork trim ornaments the house, particularly at gable bargeboards.

This By-law will become effective on the date of its passing.

This By-law read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 19th day of March, 1990.
