
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation
of the City of Toronto, on the 12th day of August, 1985
decided to designate the lands and buildings known
municipally as 500, 502 and 504 Queen Street West
(The Second Cockburn Block) as properties of architectural
and historical value or interest, under the Ontario
Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337.

Short Statement of Reasons for the Proposed Designation

The Second Cockburn Block, located at 500, 502 and 504
Queen Street West, is recommended for designation for
architectural and historical reasons. It was built in
1888-89 by George Cockburn, the Principal of Upper Canada
College from 1861 to 1881. The buildings are important
architecturally as a late Victorian commercial row that
is noteworthy for its decorative brickwork, bracketted
cornices and mansard with ornamented gables and cast iron
crestings. The row is a significant landmark that terminates
the vista at the north end of Portland Street.

Notice of the Objection to the designation may be
served on the Clerk within thirty days of the 3rd day of
September, 1985.
