PUBLIC NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Waterloo intends to designate the hereinafter mentioned properties to be of historic and/or architectural value within the meaning of Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337.

1. 157 Albert Street

This handsome residential house was originally part of a 148 acre parcel of land located in tot 13, German Company Tract acquired by David Ellis from Samuel Bricker in 1810. By 1846 when the original Georgian style structure was built it was owned by John Good. Allen Shantz became the owner in 1896 and soon renovated the building extensively, adding a semi-circular verandah with cannon ball finials. The front gable has return eaves and a blind attic window. Other windows feature eared pediments, moulded trim and authentic shutters. A stained glass transom and paired eave brackets add to the Italionate influence. This designation shall apply to the north, east and south facades of the existing house.

The Regional Municipality of Waterloo (Former Library Building) 40 Albert Street

Built as a Carnegie Library in 1905 and used from that year until 1966, this building is the only public building existing in its original form in the City of Waterloo, and is a fine example of the classic style employed at the turn of the century for such buildings. Imposing in both its construction and its location, this building is an important element of our local heritage.

NOTICE of objection to this designation may be served on the Clerk of the City of Waterloo within thirty days of this Notice. Any Notice of Objection shall indicate the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts.
