THE CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF PAISLEY "Y - LAW NUMBER 76 - 13 A UY - LAW TO DESIGNATE THE HOSE TOWER " AFELS The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974 authorizes the Council a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, ding the cuildings and structures thereon, to be of Marie or wrchitectural value or interest; WHAT the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Ity has caused to be served upon the owner of the lands The Wremises known as The HOSE TOWER and upon the Ontario "type Foundation notice of intention to so designate a presaid real property and has caused such notice of in ention to be published in a newspaper having general tistal ation in the municipality once for each of three amsecutive weeks; AND WHITEEAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "F" hereto; AND MUSICAS no notice of objection to the said proposed in a mation has been served upon the Clerk of the municipality; THERELILE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF PAISLEY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS: THAT the real property known municipally as The HOSE TOWER more narticularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto is we immaded as being of historical and architectural interest. THAT the Village Solicitor be authorized to cause a copy of this ty-law to be registered against the property decribed in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper land registry office. 3. THAT the Village Clerk be authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause asico of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having circulation in the Village of Paisley. SCHEDULE A

All and singular that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being, in the Village of Taisley in the County of Bruce and the Province of Ontario being companies of a certain part of Water Street, south of Fisher's Mill Face in the said Village of Paisley in the County and Province after al., which may be more particularly described as follows, that is in say, commencing at a post which has been planted on the easterny limit of Queen Street, on a course north, eighty one degrees fifteen minutes east from a post planted in Mill Street which mill is distant thirty links (19.8 feet) on a course north eight degreeforty five minutes from the post planted at the north east and a lot number twenty-five, on the west side of Queen Street afarous ... Hence north eighty one degrees fifteen minutes east seventy- 18 links (50.16 feet). Hence north forty four degrees east tixty links (39.6 feet) to the Saugeen River, Hence northerly and westerly along the Saugeen River and Mill Race two chains (132 feet) forty links (26.4 feet)(Total of 158.4 feet) more or less to the east side of Queen Street. Hence southerly and easterly along Ouch Street one chain thirty links (66 + 19.8 = 85.8 feet) to the miles of beginning.

SCHEDULE B:

The Hose Tower at the Market Square built in 1891 is recommended for designation for architectural reasons as a rare example of a free-standing frame hose drying tower of the late nineteenth century.

The tower has a square base (16' 6") set on concrete foundations with a pyramidal roof. The octagonal tower centred over the pyramidal roof of the bas, tapers inward to the cupola at the top. Gable dormers with an overhang are located halfway up the tower on the sides parallel to the sides of the base. The four faces of the cupola above the dormers have louvered ventilators which create the strong up-draft inside the tower. Italianate brackets under the eaves of the lower room are repeated in number but are proportionately smaller for the eaves of the cupola. Gables over the windows roof a low-relief embellishment suggestive of leaves. The interior of the octagonal tower is made of panels of interlocking diagonal bracing and much of the original system of pulleys still remains intact.

The Hose Tower serves as a focal point of the market square; it is a reminder of those pioneers who harnessed the water power of Paisley to their wills to protect the Village; the monumental tone of the structure provides a necessary definition to the area in which the war memorial is centred; and is important for preserving the character of the surrounding district.
