NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King intends to designate the properties, including lands and buildings, at the following municipal addresses as properties of architectural and historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337.

- (a) All Saints Anglican Chapel  
Lot 16, Registered Plan 85  
East Side of Keele Street, King City  
Township of King

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION:

The chapel officially opened on November 1st, 1857 and is the oldest remaining Anglican church in King Township and one of the oldest churches which has remained in continuous use. With a few notable exceptions, the church has changed little over the years and retains the integrity of the original design as well as most of the interior furnishings. The design is fairly typical of small venacular churches and represents the simple tastes and limitations of the builders as well as the scale of the community of Springhill (King City) as the time it was built.

- (b) St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Eversley  
Part of Lot 9, Concession 3  
Township of King

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION:

The church is a particularly fine example of the small venacular churches seen throughout Ontario. The historical significance of the church has long been recognized and supported by the community. Purchased in 1958 by Lady Eaton the building has been under the custodianship of first the York Pioneer and Historical Society and more recently the King Township Historical Society.

NOTICE of objection to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the Township of King before the 14th day of December, 1984.
