By-law No. L.S.P. - 2805-405

A by-law to designate Municipal Number 26 Prospect Avenue of historic and architectural value.

WHEREAS pursuant to The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337, the Council of a municipality may by by-law designate a property including buildings and structures thereon to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS notice of intention to so designate the property known as Municipal Number 26 Prospect Avenue having been duly published and served, no notice of objection was received to such designation;

The Municipal Council of The Corporation of the City of London inacts as follows:

- There is designated as being of historic and architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as Municipal Number 26 Prospect Avenue, for the reasons set out in Schedule "B" hereto.
- The City Clerk is authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered upon the title to the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.
- The City Clerk is authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in the London Free Press, and to enter the description of the aforesaid property, the name and address of its registered owner, and short reasons for its designation in the Register of all properties designated under The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980.
- 4. This by-law comes into force on the day it is passed.

### SCHEDULE "A"

All of Lot 20 on the east side of Prospect Avenue, Registered Plan 177 in the City of London in the County of Middlesex in the Province of Ontario.

## SCHEDULE "B"

to By-law No. L.S.P. - 2805 - 405

#### Architectural Reasons:

The residence at 26 Prospect Avenue was built circa 1881 and is a fine example of a wood frame two-storey structure in the Victorian Italianate style. The building is almost completely original in its appearance to 1881. It is distinguished by its elegant vertical proportions and is embellished by an ornate front porch, a bay window with cast iron cresting, and Baroque inspired brackets. The interior is also largely original with pine fireplace, archways, and door trim of the period.

#### Historical Reasons:

The residence was built for and belonged to William J. Carson, well known school principal and school inspector for the London Board of Education. The Carson Branch Library is named after him. When he dies, the residence passed into the hands of his daughter Flora Carson and remained so until purchased by the present owners in 1977.
