By-law No. L.S.P.- 2740-36

A by-law to designate 40-42 Askin Street of architectural value.

WHEREAS pursuant to The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337, the Council of a municipality may by by-law designate a property including buildings and structures thereon to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS notice of intention to so designate the property at 40-42 Askin Street having been duly published and served, no notice of objection was received to such designation;

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of The Corporation of the City of London, as follows:

- There is designated as being of architectrual value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, at 40-42 Askin Street, for the reasons set out in Schedule "B" thereto.
- The City Clerk is authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered upon the title to the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.
- The City Clerk is authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in the London Free Press, and to enter the description of the aforesaid property, the name and address of its registered owner, and short reasons for its designation in the Register of all properties designated under The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980.

SCHEDULE "B"

to By-law No. L.S.P.-2740-36

Architectural Reasons:

Erected in 1890 for Edward J. Powell, a gentleman, the house at 40-42 Asking Street is, for London, highly unusual architecturally. Although this residence has the outward appearance of a detached single family dwelling, it is, in fact, a double occupancy house cleverly disguising, by its asymmetrical structural arrangement, a common wall between the two addresses. Built of white brick, this 2 1/2 storey, double house possesses such design features as a steeply pitched, cross gable roof, single eaves brackets, and an arrangement of vertical, horizontal and diagonal boards applied at the gable ends. However, it is particularly noteworthy for the gingerbread fretwork of its gable bargeboards and its two verandas on the front and west side elevations.
