

Reasons for Designation

322 St. George Street (east side, between Grosvenor and Cromwell)

Historical Reasons

322 St. George Street has traditionally been an upper-middle class residence. The first owner was James Carlisle, a retired Fleet Engineer with the Royal Navy. Another resident was William Kingstone who was a manager of the Beck Cigar Box Manufacturing Co., and later the owner of William Kingstone Ltd., wooden cigar box manufacturers. Huron Davidson, Q.C. lived in the house throughout the 1940's and 1950's.

Architectural Reasons

This two-and-a-half storey white brick vernacular house was built in 1890. It has a slate roof and three very tall chimneys. It also has a classical style front porch and a decorated front gable with half-balls and brackets. The front window has three sections with divided upper lights. Underneath the eaves, there are dentil blocks and decorative purlins. There are four decorative, chiselled brick courses across the exterior of the house. The house displays a variety of window types, including romanesque, segmental arched and square.
