Reasons for Designation – 527 Grey Street

Built circa 1881, this house is a good example of an Ontario cottage featuring unusually good proportions.

Historical

The first recorded inhabitant was James E. Keenleyside. The Keenleyside family in 1878 formed the partnership of Perrin & Keenleyside, wholesale bakers and confectioners. This partnership dissolved two years later with James Keenleyside becoming partner in Hourd, Keenleyside and McKay Baby Carriage Mfg., also known at the time as Dominion Baby Carriage, London's first baby buggy manufacturer. By 1918 James E. Keenleyside was the chief License Inspector for London & Middlesex County.

Architectural

This Ontario cottage has an excellent symmetrical three bay design. The exterior walls and foundation are made of early London white brick. Original serpentine gingerbread ending in leaves adorns the front gable. The window in the front gable has a semi-circular brick arch. The large front windows are each headed by segmental arch made of brick voussoirs. Inside the living room an original oak fireplace and mantel remain in near mint condition.

The east elevation features a three-window bay with a gable above; unusual in Ontario cottages. The windows in the bay are headed with brick voussoirs similar to the front windows. The gable is supported by a pair of intricate brackets at each corner and the gable face features shingle cladding with diamond-patterned blocking in the peak supported by brackets each side of the attic window. The gable fascia includes a detailed fluted pattern in place of the gingerbread found on the front gable.

Context

The house sits on one of the last oversized lots of land in the neighbourhood allowing it to stand out and noticeably enhancing the streetscape.

I agree with the above Reasons for Designation for 527 Grey Street.
