NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE PURSUANT TO PART IV OF THE ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT

Oakville Town Council intends to designate the property commonly known and referred to as The Old Radial Station, 139 Thomas Street, as a property of historic and architectural value and interest pursuant to the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974.

Reason for Proposed Designation

The Old Radial Station is a well preserved example of a salt box style electric railway station. The simple structure with its roof line extension represents a unique form of architecture. Historically the building is the original eastern terminal of the Oakville-Hamilton radial railway. It represents a significant era in the industrialization of transportation modes in Oakville. The radial railway had been in operation since 1875 and was extended to Oakville in 1904. In 1906 the radial line was extended across the Sixteen Mile Creek via a new bridge to the terminal at Thomas Street.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the undersigned The Clerk of the Corporation of the Town of Oakville within thirty days from the 1st day of March, 1995 being the date upon which this notice was first published in the Oakville Beaver newspaper.
