### 141 BRONTE ROAD

The first Anglican services in Bronte began in 1909 in the farmhouse of John Wilson. The Old Church of the Epiphany at 141 Bronte Road was built in 1931 as the home of the Anglican Church in Bronte and was erected on lands donated by John Wilson.

Although no longer the main church of the congregation of the Church of the Epiphany, the building remains in good condition and is still used for various functions by the Church.

The Old Church of the Epiphany is a 20 X 30 foot white clapboard building. The building is reminiscent of the gothic style of the nineteenth century with its pointed lancet multipaned windows, high gable roof, gabled porch and belfry.

The Old Church of the Epiphany is one of the few remaining significant heritage buildings from Bronte's past and is a reminder of the important role that the Anglican Church has played in Bronte.
