NOTICES OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Town of Oakville intends to designate the properties listed below pursuant to Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act. Summaries of the reasons for the proposed designations are set out in Schedule "A" to this notice. A detailed Heritage Structure Report of each property may be obtained at the Clerk's Department, Oakville Municipal Building, 1225 Trafalgar Road during regular business hours.

Notices of objection to the proposed designations, setting out the reason for the objection and all relevant facts, may be served on the Clerk of the Corporation of the Town of Oakville, within 30 days from the 28th day of October, 1992 being the date upon which this notice was first published in the Oakville Beaver newspaper.

SCHEDULE "A"

THE COX ESTATE PIONEER CEMETERY

The Cox Estate Pioneer Cemetery was established circa 1833 and is the resting place for some of Trafalgar Township's earliest settlers. After a series of owners, the property surrounding the cemetery on present day Wedgewood Drive was purchased in 1909 by Herbert Coplin Cox as part of the grounds of his Lakeshore Estate and has since been known as the Cox Estate Pioneer Cemetery.

The Cox Estate Pioneer Cemetery is a 50 foot square of property set between two houses on Wedgewood Drive. Within the cemetery are three marble headstones laid flat in the ground surrounded by a stand of mature trees. South of the headstones are the concrete foundations for a water tower on the former Cox Estate.
