BY-LAW NO. 1981-7

A by-law to designate the property known municipally as 13 Burke Street, as being of architectural and historical value or interest.

WHEREAS Section 29 of The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974 authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural and historic value or interest.

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Penetanguishene has caused to be served on the owners of the lands and premises known as Penetanguishene Centennial Museum at 13 Burke Street, and upon The Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the clerk of the municipality;

THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Penetanguishene enacts as follows:

- 1. There is designated as being of architectural and historical value or interest the real property known as the Penetanguishene Centennial Museum, at 13 Burke Street, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto;
- 2. The Municipal solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper land registry office.
- 3. The Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this bylaw to be served on the owner of the aforesaid property and
 on The Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of
 the passing of this by-law to be published in the same
 newspaper having general circulation in the municipality
 once for each of three consecutive weeks.

SCHEDULE "B" TO BY-LAW NO. 1981-7

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

In 1875 C. Beck built a general store at Burke Street and Nelson Streets where he sold everything from hardware to groceries.

The building, a rectangular, single, two storey building with wings on the rear and both sides, still remains standing on its original site.

The main door, centered between two large windows is made of wood grain and located to the centre of the gable facade.

These two large bays were used as display windows in Beck's time so his hardware supplies could be seen by the passerby. Today the large windows are used to display the old antiques and furniture used in the days of C. Beck as the building has been converted into a museum since 1968.

This building is a credit to our heritage and future.
