NOTICE OF DESIGNATING BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa on the 20th day of January , 1982, enacted By-law Number 17-82 designating the lands and buildings known municipally as 243 Augusta Street as a property of historical and architectural value or interest under the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337.

STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION:

The building at 243 Augusta Street is recommended for designation as being of architectural and historical value. Built in 1866, this building has been associated with numerous prominent citizens of Ottawa as well as being the home of the Right Honourable Lester B. Pearson from 1947 to 1954.

The building is a one and one-half storey brick structure with stucco finish. It is highlighted by its steeply pitched gables and dormers. A cut bargeboard with finial and a one storey wood verandah. In its overall exterior appearance this building is an outstanding example of a small single family residence built during the initial development of Sandy Hill.

The above does not make reference to the design of the building's interior.

A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 243 Augusta Street to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as 243 Augusta Street more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the Ottawa Citizen newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on the 31st day of October, the 7th and 14th days of November, 1981;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Ottawa;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:

- 1. There is designated as being of historic and architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 243 Augusta Street.
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.

- 3: The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owners of the property described in Schedule "A", and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa.
- 4. The schedules attached hereto and marked Schedule "A" and Schedule "B" form part of this by-law and all notations, references and other information contained therein shall be as much a part of this by-law as if all the matters and information set forth by the said schedules were all fully described herein.
