CITY OF NANTICOKE

BY-LAW NO. 49-81

Being a by-law to designate a property located at 150 Main Street South, former Town of Waterford, now City of Nanticoke, as property of historic and architectural value. (Green-Kerr Residence)

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act, S.O. 1974, Chapter 122, as amended, which provides for the conservation, protection and preservation of the heritage of Ontario, provides that the Council of a municipality may designate a property within the municipality to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the City of Nanticoke deems it desirable to designate the property located at 150 Main Street South, former Town of Waterford, Lot 15, Block P, Plan 19B, now in the City of Nanticoke, as being property of historic and architectural value and interest;

AND WHEREAS the procedures required by PART IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974 as amended, have been carried out and no Notice of Objection to the Notice of Intention to Designate the aforementioned property was received;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the City of Nanticoke hereby enacts as follows:

1. (a) THAT the property, known locally as the Green-Kerr Residence, and located at 150 Main Street South, former Town of Waterford, Lot 15, Block P, Plan 19B, now in the City of Nanticoke, Region of Haldimand-Norfolk, be hereby designated as property of historic and architectural value and interest for the purposes of The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, as amended.
2. (a) A copy of this by-law, together with Schedule "A" attached hereto and forming part of this by-law, setting out the reasons for designation, shall be registered against the property affected in the Registry Division of Norfolk, and served upon the owner and The Ontario Heritage Foundation.

(b) A notice of the by-law shall be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Nanticoke.
3. This by-law shall come into force and effect from the date of its final passing thereof.

SCHEDULE "A"

City of Nanticoke
GREEN-KERR RESIDENCE
REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

(pursuant to The Ontario Heritage Act, S.O. 1974, Chapter 122, as amended)

Property is located at 150 Main Street South, former Town of Waterford, Lot 15, Block P, Plan 19B, now in the City of Nanticoke, Region of Haldimand-Norfolk.

The property, known locally as the Green-Kerr Residence, is deemed to be of historic value and interest as it is important as being the home of James L. Green, circa 1847, one of the most prominent figures in the history of Waterford.

Architecturally, the house exhibits the fine proportions and monumental appearance, characteristic of the classical Greek Revival style. The house was built of solid brick in a nearly square plan. The second storey is masked to look like the entablature of a one storey building, with iron grills covering the windows. A parapet of free standing colonnettes crowns the roof.
