NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE



TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Nanticoke intends to designate the properties, including lands and buildings, at the following municipal addresses as properties of architectural and/or historical value or interest under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337.

- (a) Part of Lot 4, Concession 1, in the former Township of Walpole, now in the City of Nanticoke in the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk. The property known as the Low-Morrow-Stelco Inc. building is an example of polychrome masonry farm residence built in the 1870's. The character of the original house with its decorative detailing particularly on the facade, has been retained while the building's function has changed from a rural residence to Stelco Inc's Community Relations Centre in a 20th century industrial development.
- (b) Part of Lot 24, Concession 2, in the former Township of Walpole, now in the City of Nanticoke in the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk. The property known as the Knisley-Lindsay Residence is unique in the City of Nanticoke being the only known surviving example of a building constructed of sun-dried mud blocks. The blocks are protected by clapboard.

Notice of objection to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the City of Nanticoke before the 12th day of June, 1982.
