## NOTICE OF DESIGNATING BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa on the 20th day of February , 1980, enacted By-law Number 64-80 designating the lands and buildings known municipally as 197 Wurtemburg Street as a property of historical and architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, Statutes of Ontario 1974, Chapter 122, as amended.

STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION:

The Children's Hospital, at 197 Wurtemburg Street, is recommended for designation as being of architectural and historical interest. Erected c. 1869, probably for William F. Whitcher, Commissioner of Fisheries, the original portion of the building was a two-storey, pitch roofed, rough cast Picturesque Gothic residence with a centre projecting frontispiece and two symmetrical side gables. The Children's Hospital occupied the structure from 1888 until 1904, probably adding the two wings and the Late Victorian half timbering after 1896. A later notable occupant was Senator Louis Côté. The building became the present Embassy of Turkey in 1953.

BY-LAW NUMBER ...64-80.

A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 197 Wurtemburg Street to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

WHEREAS The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, Statutes of Ontario, 1974, Chapter 122, as amended, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as 197 Wurtemburg Street more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in The Ottawa Journal newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on October 13, 1979, October 20, 1979 and October 27, 1979;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Ottawa;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:-

- There is designated as being of historic and architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 197 Wurtemburg Street
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.

- 3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the property described in Schedule "A", and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa.
- 4. The Schedules attached hereto and marked Schedule "A" and Schedule "B" form part of this by-law and all notations, references and other information contained therein shall be as much a part of this by-law as if all the matters and information set forth by the said schedules were all fully described herein.
