



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BY-LAW NO. 2000-31

Corporation of the Town of Simcoe

BEING A BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE THE LYNNWOOD PARK, LANDS AND BUILDINGS, BEING ALL OF BLOCK 82, PLAN 182 IN THE TOWN OF SIMCOE KNOWN MUNICIPALLY AS 91 NORFOLK STREET NORTH, SIMCOE AS BEING OF HISTORICAL VALUE OR INTEREST.

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter 0.18, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact By-laws to designate real property; including all buildings and structures thereof, to be of historical value or interest;

AND WHEREAS notice of intention to designate Lynnwood Park, being Block 82, Plan 182, in the Town of Simcoe, known municipally as 91 Norfolk Street North, Simcoe was served on the Owner and The Ontario Heritage Foundation and such notice of intention was published in the Simcoe Reformer, a newspaper having general circulation in the municipality, on April 17, 2000;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Clerk of the Municipality.

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF SIMCOE ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. **THAT** there is designated as being of historical value or interest, the real property know as the Lynnwood Park, being Block 82, Plan 182, in the Town of Simcoe, known municipally as 91 Norfolk Street North, Simcoe, in the Town of Simcoe, as more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto.
- THAT the Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this By-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the Land Registry Office at Simcoe, Ontario.
- 3. **THAT** the Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served on the owner of the property described in Schedule "A" hereto and on the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of the passing of this By-law to be published in the Simcoe Reformer.

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THAT the effective date of this By-law shall be the date of final passing hereof. 4.

BY-LAW NO. 2000-31

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Town of Simcoe in the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk described as all of Block 82, on Plan 182, Town of Simcoe.

BY-LAW NO. 2000-31

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

Historical Significance: Lynnwood Park is a 4 acre site of stately trees and grassy knolls centrally located in the Town of Simcoe. It borders along the east side of Norfolk Street, the town's main north-south artery. Tradition claims, it was under a mighty oak in this park that Lieutenant-Governor Simcoe granted Aaron Culver a mill site privilege which set in motion the course of development for the Town of Simcoe. Later, as part of the grounds of Lynnwood Estate, this northern section was fenced and allowed to remain a natural preserve for deer.

The foresight of our predecessors has ensured that this historic piece of ground remain as parkland. In 1903, Lynnwood Park was given as a gift to the Town with conditions that would preserve its natural and historical identity. The preservation of this parkland has allowed subsequent park development to form a greenspace corridor throughout the Town of Simcoe, which gives bikers and hikers of Simcoe access virtually to the shores of Lake Erie. Without the foresight of pioneer settler, Duncan Campbell, the Town of Simcoe would be missing a vital downtown link in its present day park system. This park corridor extends through the heart of town. While alive, Duncan Campbell maintained this parkland in its virginal Carolinian Forest state. Because of its significant historical value, Campbell's wishes were that the park be preserved for public use throughout posterity. It is important to respect the wishes of Duncan Campbell that the park be used for the enjoyment of the public and not function as a moneymaking venue.

The historical significance of Lynnwood Park is already acknowledged by a Provincial Plaque, a stone cairn and a large erratic however both the natural and historical significance of this park should continue to be recognized by the public and protected by the Town of Simcoe.

For these reasons Lynnwood Park warrants designation as a property of historical importance in the Town of Simcoe and protection under the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990. This cultural landscape which has evolved over history should be preserved and any future plantings should be appropriate to the native Carolinian forest.
