

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of
the City of Ottawa on the 1st day of April, 1981,
enacted By-law Number 129-81 designating the lands and
buildings known municipally as 314 St. Patrick Street, St. Brigid's
Church, as a property of architectural value or interest
under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, Statutes of Ontario 1974,
Chapter 122, as amended.

STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION:

St. Brigid's Church at 314 St. Patrick Street is
recommended for designation as being of architectural interest.
Erected in 1889-1890, this massive limestone structure with
pitched roof and two towers of different heights was designed
by J. K. Bowes in eclectic Victorian style, with basic Gothic
Revival form and extensive Renaissance Baroque Revival detail.

It has historically served as the parish church for
the Irish Catholic working class residents of Lowertown. In
its overall exterior appearance, the church is a significant
remainder of their contribution to the growth of Bytown and
Ottawa.

A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 314 St. Patrick Street, St. Brigid's Church, to be of architectural value or interest;

WHEREAS The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, Statutes of Ontario, 1974, Chapter 122, as amended, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owner of the lands and premises known as 314 St. Patrick St., St. Brigid's Church, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the Ottawa Journal newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on August 2nd, 9th, and 16th, 1980;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Ottawa;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:-


1. There is designated as being of architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 314 St. Patrick Street, St. Brigid's Church;
2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.

3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the property described in Schedule "A", and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa.

4. The Schedules attached hereto and marked Schedule "A" and Schedule "B" form part of this by-law and all notations, references and other information contained therein shall be as much a part of this by-law as if all the matters and information set forth by the said schedules were all fully described herein.

SCHEDULE "A"

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the City of Ottawa, Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton and Province of Ontario, being composed of all of lot number 25 and all of lot number 26 both on the south side of St. Patrick Street and the east half of lot number 25 and all of lot number 26 both on the north side of Murray Street, according to a plan registered in the Land Registry Office for the Land Registry Division of Ottawa-Carleton Number 5 as number 42482.
