THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTH DUMFRIES

BY-LAW NO. 1150-89

BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE THE HOUSE, R. R. NO. 1,
AYR, IN THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTH DUMFRIES,
TO BE OF HISTORIC AND ARCHITECTURAL
VALUE AND INTEREST.

WHEREAS Section 29 of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980 authorizes Council of a municipality to designate property within the municipality to be of historic value or interest;

AND WHEREAS Council for The Corporation of the Township of North Dumfries deems it desirable to designate the House, R. R. No. 1, Ayr, built in 1870, to be of historic and architectural value and interest;

AND WHEREAS the Clerk of the Township of North Dumfries has caused Notice of Intention to Designate to be given in accordance with Section 29(3) of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980;

AND WHEREAS no Notice of Objection has been served on the Clerk within the meaning of Section 29(5) of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980.

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTH DUMFRIES ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. The property described in Schedule "A" attached hereto is hereby designated to be of historic and architectural value and interest.

- 2. Section 33 of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980 shall apply to the complete exterior, including the log addition, save and except the garage on the West Side of the dwelling.
- 3. This By-law shall come into effect on the final passing thereof by the Council of The Corporation of the Township of North Dumfries.



SCHEDULE "A"

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of North Dumfries, in the Regional Municipality of Waterloo (formerly in the Township of North Dumfries) and Province of Ontario and being composed of Part of Lots 37 and 38, in the Twelfth Concession in the said Township of North Dumfries and designated as Part 1, Plan 67R-1079.

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

Residence of

Part Lot 37, Conc. 12, Twp. Rd. #8, North Dumfries Twp. (R.R. #1, Ayr)

Historical Significance:

This farmstead was purchased by Francis Tillie Sr. from Wm. Dickson Jr. in 1862. The Tillie family had emigrated from Scotland. The 1861 Canada West census indicates that a one-storey frame building was on the property at that time. The 1871 census however no longer listed what buildings were on the property, but the Cambridge Assessment Office estimates the date of construction of the stone house as circa 1870. In 1874 the ownership of the farm was transferred to Francis Tillie Jr. He served on the Municipal Council of North Dumfries from 1865 to 1870. In 1879 the property passed out of the ownership of the Tillie family to Daniel D. Snyder. Daniel Snyder also served on Municipal Council from 1878 to 1882. Snyder sold to Abraham Hallman in 1882. years to follow the property changed hands frequently. The next significant owners were Dr. Donald A. and Marjorie Cameron, who acquired the property in June 1968. The Camerons were responsible for the addition of the log wing, which was originally a complete house in Elmwood, Ontario. Its date of construction is reported to be circa 1882. It was dismantled and numbered for re-assembly with the assistance of several Waterloo County Mennonites and completed in 1972. In 1977 the Camerons sold the house to and in 1987. turn sold to and

Architectural Significance:

The one and a half storey main house has a rectangular long facade and is constructed of even course cut stone on the south facade, with field-stone on the other three sides. The main entrance is situated on the south elevation, featuring voussiers, transom and sidelights around the front door. A centre gable features elegant bargeboard, and a pointed window partially surrounded by decorative blocks. The log wing is located at the rear north elevation and is constructed of horizontal finished rock elm logs.

It is proposed that the designation covers the complete exterior, including the log addition, and excluding the garage on the west side of the house.

The stone house c. 1870, set in an attractive rolling landscape, is a well preserved example of a farmhouse of that era. The log wing, although not originally built on the site, is an excellent example of rock elm log construction and the combination of a stone house and a log house represents a unique architectural style.
