

TOWN OF NEWCASTLE TAKE NOTICE THAT:

WHEREAS the Bowmanville Museum, 37 Silver Street, Bowmanville, is recommended for designation for historical reasons because it was the home of David Fisher, a local merchant who served on Bowmanville's first municipal council and who later became the local Collector of Customs, and eventually cashier of the Ontario Bank. It was also the home of J.H.H. Jury, one of the founders of the chain of Jury and Lovell drugstores and an equally prominent local citizen. It is also recommended for designation for architectural reasons as it is one of the earliest brick houses built in Bowmanville (c. 1847) and because in 1861 the original single storey house was very successfully converted into a pretentious home in the Italianate style and as such represents the best example of that style known to have been built in Bowmanville.

AND WHEREAS the Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee of the Town of Newcastle has recommended that the buildings and property be 'designated property' under the terms of the Ontario Heritage Act;

THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newcastle intends to designate the Bowmanville Museum as a 'designated property' under Section 29, subsections 1-4 of the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974.

Any person may, within 30 days after the date of this Notice, deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Newcastle notice of his objection to this intention together with a statement of his reasons for objecting and specifically detailing why the property should not be designated.

The last day for filing will be the 20th day of April, 1979.
