NOTICE

IN THE MATTER OF THE ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT, R.S.O. 1990, CHAPTER 0.18, AND IN THE MATTER OF THE LANDS AND PREMISES KNOWN AS "THE ELLIOTT HOMESTEAD", LOCATED AT 10464 TORBRAM ROAD, IN THE CITY OF BRAMPTON, IN THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the City of Brampton intends to designate the lands and buildings of "The Elliott Homestead" located at 10464 Torbram Road in the City of Brampton, in the Province of Ontario, as a property of historical, architectural and contextual significance under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.0.18.

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION

The Elliott Homestead is recommended for heritage designation for reasons of its historical, architectural and contextual significance. Historically, the property on which the farm house stands was conveyed by deed to George Elliott in 1834. In 1876 his son, William Elliott, commissioned contractors James Voakes and William McCulla to build the present structure. William McCulla was an active figure in public life serving as a member of Brampton Council, Mayor of Brampton, Warden of the County of Peel and as a Federal Member of Parliament for Peel. William Elliott and his descendants would continue to farm the property and live in the house until 1994, one of the longest occupancies in Peel.

Architecturally, the one and one half story farm house built in the Gothic Revival style was illustrated in the <u>Historical Atlas of the County of Peel County</u> in 1877 and has altered little since then. The main part of the structure is rectangular in form with a three bay facade and has two wings to the rear creating an H shaped plan. The house is built of red clay brick with buff brick accents on a foundation of local shale. To the rear of the house is a C.1876 smoke house/wash house with a bell tower on the roof.

Contextually the farm house is an important reminder of the pioneer farm heritage of Chinguacousy Township.
