Brampton, in the Province of Ontario, as a property of
historic, architectural and contextual significance under
Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.O.18.

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION

The Royal Canadian Legion Building at 40 Elizabeth
Street South (Kenneth Chisholm Estate) is recommend-
ed for designation for reasons of historical, contextual
and architectural significance. Kenneth Chisholm was
one of the most influential citizens of his day in
Brampton. A prominent businessman, Chisholm served
as a Village Reeve, County of Peel Warden and eventu-
ally the areas representative in the Provincial
Legislature. The estate which he built (known as "Alder
Lea") gave the City one of its most significant residential
dwellings (currently used by Branch 15 of the Royal
Canadian Legion) and contributed to the creation of one
of its most significant public places (Gage Park).
