BY-LAW NUMBER 661-83

To designate the "The Anchorage" located at the Bradley House Museum Complex, of architectural value and of historical interest.

WHEREAS The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic or architectural value or interest; and



WHEREAS notice of intention to so designate the "The Anchorage" located at the Bradley House Museum Complex, having been duly published and served and no notice of objection to such designation having been received by the Council of the Corporation of the City of Mississauga.

WHEREAS the reasons for the said designation are set out as Schedule 'A' hereto;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Mississauga enacts as follows:

1. That the real property, more particularly described in Schedule 'B' hereto, known as the "The Anchorage" located at the Bradley House Museum Complex, be designated as being of architectural and historic value or interest.
2. That the City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Mississauga.


SCHEDULE 'A' TO BY-LAW NO. 66153

SHORT STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR
THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION

Architecturally, The Anchorage is a particularly fine example of an Ontario Regency style house with its one-and-a-half store, height, five-bay facade, square plan and hipped roof with broad projecting eaves. It has a fine Neo-classical doorcase with sidelights and engaged pilasters. Interior features of importance include the room layout on the ground floor, the mid-19th century centre arch in the hall and staircase to the second floor, an original mantelpiece and original base boards and trim. Historically, the house, a prominent local landmark, was built in the 1830's by James W. Taylor, but given the name "The Anchorage" by its next owner John Skynner, a retired Commander of the Royal Navy.

Description: Part of Lot 28, Concession 3 South of Dundas Street

ALL AND SINGULAR, that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the City of Mississauga, Regional Municipality of Peel, (formerly in the Township of Toronto, County of Peel), Province of Ontario and being composed of that part of Lot 28 in the Third Concession South of Dundas Street in the said City designated as Part 1 on a reference plan deposited in the Land Registry Office for the Registry Division of Peel (No. 43) as 43R-5206.
