TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town
of Cobalt intends to designate the property,
including lands and buildings, at the following municipal address
as a property of architectural and/or historical value or interest
under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Municipal Address: 78 Jamieson Street, Cobalt, Ontario.

Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Hylands House is recommended for designation for architectural and historical reasons. It was built in 1908 by a mining engineer, James Hylands. Typical of many early Cobalt houses in its entrances at two levels, stairs, and L-Plan gable roof, due to the social position of the owner it also incorporates stylistic elements taken from the Queen Anne mode of the late nineteenth century. These include the two-storey bay window, brackets at the roof corners, peaked dormer, and gabled "tower" in the angle of the building. Although aluminum siding and modernized windows have slightly altered the appearances of the structure, the Hylands House remains a charming survival from the days of the "Cobalt Camp".

Notice of objection to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the Town of Cobalt before the 26th day of October, 1978.
