Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The hamlet of Headford grew up around a grist mill built by John C. Burr in 1832. By the time the property was purchased by David Hislop in 1874, the mill had seen many owners and numerous improvements. The milling operation prospered, enabling Hislop to construct a prestigious brick residence in 1877.


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The house was built in the Picturesque style, with an L-shaped main block, cross-gabled roof, segmentally-headed windows, and a canted bay window. The wide front door is surmounted with a segmentally-headed transom light. Walls are of white brick with tuck pointing in red. A millstone motif is worked into the gables, signifying the association with the milling operation.

Notice of objection to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the Town of Richmond Hill before the 16th day of May, 1997. Service may be made by delivery personally to the Clerk or by registered mail.

If service is made by registered mail, it is not effective unless and until it is actually received by the Clerk and the responsibility for ensuring it is received within the prescribed time rests with the person filing the objection. If such a notice is actually received after the prescribed time, it will not be accepted by the Clerk as a valid objection.
