



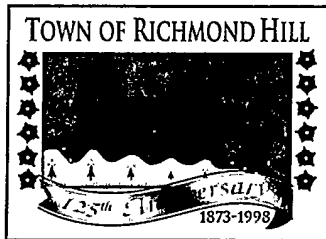

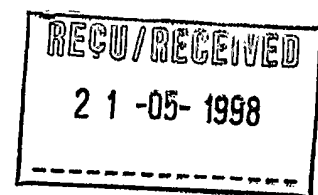

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill intends to designate the following property, including lands and building, as a property of historic or architectural value or interest, under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter 0.18:

Municipal Address: 9920 Leslie Street

Historical Reference: The Cyrus Mapes House

Reasons for the Proposed Designation:



The Cyrus Mapes House is recommended for designation for historical and architectural reasons.

In 1860, Cyrus Mapes, a carpenter and cabinet maker, built a cabinet maker's shop on a quarter acre purchased from John C. Burr, the owner of the Old Mill Farm at Headford. During the summer of 1861, he constructed a modest, board and batten-clad frame house adjoining his place of business. The property remained in the family until 1945. In 1996, the house was moved to the Horner Farm, 9920 Leslie Street, where it was restored.




The house is a virtually intact example of a mid-19th century tradesman's cottage. Although the scale of the structure is small, architectural details such as the deep eaves returns and large six over six windows are of a size more appropriate for a much more substantial building. The centre gable is original, but the round-headed window appears to be a later addition.

A more detailed Reasons for Designation may be viewed at the Office of the Clerk, Ground Floor, 225 East Beaver Creek Road.

Notice of objection to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the Town of Richmond Hill before the 19th day of June, 1998. Service may be made by delivery personally to the Clerk or by registered mail.

If service is made by registered mail, it is not effective unless and until it is actually received by the Clerk and the responsibility for ensuring it is received within the prescribed time rests with the person filing the objection. If such a notice is actually received after the prescribed time, it will not be accepted by the Clerk as a valid objection.
