



THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL BY-LAW NO. 62-85 A By-law to Designate the Property Known Municipally as 10,100 Yonge Street, Richmond Hill, as being of Architectural and/or Historical value or interest.

WHEREAS Section 28 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, authorizes the Council of a Municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural and/or historic value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill has caused to be served on the owners of the lands and premises known as the M. L. McConaghy Public School, 10,100 Yonge Street, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, Notice of Intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such Notice of Intention to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "B" attached hereto;

AND WHEREAS no Notice of Objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Clerk of the Municipality;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- There is designated as being of architectural and/or historical value or interest the real property known as the M. L. McConaghy Public School located at 10,100 Yonge Street more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto.
- The Town Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" attached hereto in the Land Registry Office.
- The Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this By-law to be served on the owner of the aforesaid property and on the Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause Notice of the passing of this by-law to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks.
- Schedules "A" and "B" attached hereto shall form part of this 4. by-law.

SCHEDULE "A" TO BY-LAW NO. 62-85

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of lands and premises lying and being in the Town of Richmond Hill in The Regional Municipality of York and being composed of Part of Lot 46, Concession 1 (being Lot 378, according to Reuben's Plan 482 or Lot 33 and Part of Lot 34, according to Gibson's Plan 482) designated as Part 1 on Plan 65R-7120.

Reasons for Designation

M. L. McConaghy Public School is designated for historical and architectural reasons. The school stands on the site donated for school use by James Miles in the early 1800s. This site has been in continuous use for educational purposes ever since. The school was designed and built in 1915 by two local men, John Innes of L. Innes and Sons, and William Graham, an active builder in Richmond Hill in the first quarter of the 20th century. It was later named for Mary Lillian McConaghy, who had taught there for 40 years, and who was a great niece of James Miles.

The school is built in the Queen Anne Revival style.
