



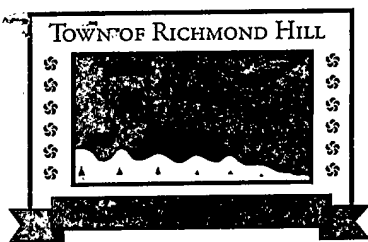

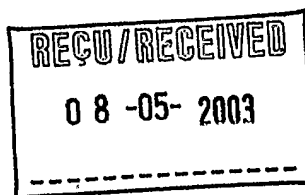

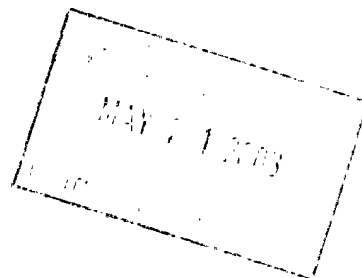

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill intends to designate the following property, including lands and building, as a property of historic or architectural value or interest, under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter 0.18:

Municipal Address: N/W corner of Leslie Street and Major Mackenzie Drive East,
Richmond Hill

Historical Reference: The Horner Cemetery

Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Horner Cemetery is recommended for designation as a property of cultural heritage value or interest.

The Horner family came from Pennsylvania to Markham Township in 1806, establishing a homestead on Lot 21, Concession 2 in 1807. They were Pennsylvania Germans of the Tunker or Dunkard faith, an Anabaptist Christian sect related to the Mennonites. When Daniel Horner Sr. Died in 1825, a small family cemetery was established at the south east corner of the farm, in a picturesque location overlooking the Rouge River. At least seven members of the Horner family are interred here.



A more detailed Reasons for Designation may be viewed at the Office of the Town Clerk, Ground Floor, 225 East Beaver Creek Road.

Notice of objection to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the Town of Richmond Hill before the 5th day of June, 2003. Service may be made by delivery personally to the Clerk or by registered mail. If service is made by registered mail, it is not effective unless and until it is actually received by the Clerk and the responsibility for ensuring it is received within the prescribed time rests with the person filing the objection. If such a notice is actually received after the prescribed time, it will not be accepted by the Clerk as a valid objection.
