

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Pickering intends to designate the property, including lands and buildings, at the following municipal address as a property of architectural and historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter 0.18.

Dillingham-Lamorie House
1636 Arathorn Court
Pickering, Ontario.

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

The Dillingham-Lamorie House is located at 1636 Arathorn Court, Concession 2, Lot 19, half way between the Third Concession and Finch Avenue on the west side of Brock Road. The property was first settled by Stephen and May Dillingham in the 1830's. Built *circa* 1850, possibly in the 1840's, the house is an important example of an early-to-mid nineteenth century rural residential building.

TAKE NOTICE that any person or agency may appeal this Notice by filing with the Clerk of the Corporation of the City of Pickering a statement outlining the reasons for the objection within 30 days of the date of the Notice of Intention to Designate.
