CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF PRESCOTT BY-LAW NO. 34-85

BEING A BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE THE FACADE OF THE PROPERTY KNOWN MUNICIPALLY AS THE MECHANICS BLOCK, 130 KING STREET WEST AS BEING OF ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL VALUE OR INTEREST.

WHEREAS Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, Chapter 337 R.S.O. 1980 authorizes the Council of a Municipality to enact By-Laws to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural or historic value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Prescott has caused to be served on the owners of the lands and premises known as

The Mechanics Block, 130 King Street West and upon the Ontario Heritage foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Clerk of the Municipality;

THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Prescott enacts as follows:

- 1) There is designated as being of Architectural and Historical value or interest the facade of the real property known as the Mechanics Block at 130 King Street West more particularly described in Schedule A hereto.
- 2) That the Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this By-Law together with the reasons for designation as detailed in Appendage A to be registered against the property described in Schedule A hereto in the local Land Registry Office.
- 3) That the Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this By-Law to be served on the owner of the aforesaid property and on the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this By-Law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Town of Prescott.

ALL and Singular th atcertain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the Town of Prescott, in the County of Grenville and in the Province of Ontario, and being composed of the West quarter of Lot Number 7, Block 2, according to Chipman's Plan Number 19 for the Town of Prescott, on the North side of King Street, SAVING AND EXCEPTING therefrom the northerly or rear 10 feet of the said parcel of land and acrosss the whole width thereof. TOGETHER with a right-of-way with others entitled thereto over certain portions of Lot Number 7 on the North side of King Street aforesaid and Lot Number 7 on the South side of Henry Street, in Block 2, Chipman's Plan 19 for the Town of Prescott, more particularly described as follows:

FIRSTIY:

COMMENCING at the northeast corner of Lot Number 7 on the North side of King Street;

THENCE South 370 East 10 feet to a point;

THENCE South 53° West 84 feet 6 inches to the side line between Lots Numbers 7 and 8 on the North side of King Street aforesaid;

THENCE North 37° West 20 feet to a point;

THENCE North 53° East 84 feet 6 inches to the side line between Lots Numbers 6 and 7 on the South side of Henry Street, Block 2, Chipman's Plan 19 for Prescott aforesaid;

THENCE East 37° 10 feet more or less to the place of beginning of said herein before described parcel containing by admeasurement 1682 square feet more or less;

SECONDLY:

COMMENCING on the North boundary of Lot Number 7. on the South side of Henry Street where it is intersected by a line dividing the East and West halves of said Lot;

THENCE South 530 West 6 feet to a point;

THENCE South 37° East 125 feet more or less to a point;

THENCE North 53° East 12 feet to a point;

THENCE North 37^{0} West 125 feet to the South side of Henry Street aforesaid;

THENCE South 53⁰ West along said South side of Henry Street 6 feet more or less to the place of beginning.

DESIGNATION REPORT OF PRESCOTT LACAC

The Mechanics Block Building:

Location:

118-132 King Street West, Prescott Town Lot #7, Block #2 on the north side of King Street

A. Reasons for Designation:

The Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee recommends the designation of the Mechanics Block for the following reasons:

- The Mechanics Block was an important contribution to the main business street of Prescott when it was completed in 1874. It could hold its own with the other three-storey brick business premises constructed along King Street in the building boom of the 1870's.
- 2. The Mechanics Block remains an integral part of the present downtown streetscape. The commercial buildings of the 1870's continue to dominate the main street and to determine its character even today. Their preservation is important.

B. Historical Background:

On 9 May 1874 Thomas Coates, a tinsmith, Samuel Miles Coons, a cabinet maker, and Nesfield Ward, a contractor, purchased from Peter Moran, merchant, Lot #7 on the north side of King Street in Prescott. At the same time Thomas Coates signed an indenture undertaking to construct on the property he had just purchased "a good and substantial stone or brick building with a gable end wall of three stories in height and eight inches in thickness" and promised to allow Peter Moran to share this gable end wall as a "party wall". The three property owners co-operated in the construction of one large business block on their building sites. The completed building bears a plague in the centre of the facade stating "Mechanics Block - 1874". Construction must

have been completed just before the end of the year for the Prescott TELEGRAPH reported that the good Templars of Prescott 3 had moved into their hall in the Mechanics Block on December 2nd. The tax collectors roll for the east ward of Prescott reveals an increase in the real property assessment for the lot in question of over ten fold between 1874 and 1875, a clear reflection of the value of the substantial business block which the owners had constructed.⁴

C. Architectural Description:

The Mechanics Building is a three-storey building, the facade of which is faced with yellow brick while the sides and back are constructed of red brick. There are four bays across the facade, each containing three windows which have stone sills and arched limestone cornices supported by small consoles. The large wooden cornice across the top of the building is decorated with brackets terminating in acorn-shaped finials. On the street level three of the four original storefronts are still intact.
